

In late July year 12 students attended the Skills West Expo in Perth. The Expo hosted over 80 organisations and employers with career opportunities for all. Students were able to talk with training organisations & employers, gain career advice and enjoy the interactive displays.











Year 10

Another busy term has now finished, and students have worked very hard achieving great results. This term we have introduced Preliminary Unit 1 in Maths and English where students have been building on their skills to complete tasks with greater independence. Some examples of student's tasks have been exploring the concept of community and looking at their place in it by reading maps, making practice emergency phone calls for an ambulance, examining workplace and community rules. Now they are moving onto creating their own newspaper articles amongst other activities.

In Community Access, students were out and about on public transport using their skills to travel safely, make practice emergency phone calls to the school, and follow their travel plans. Students attended a Transperth Network Tour where the Transperth Education Officer, Raj Patel, showed students a variety of ways to travel safely and where to seek help if needed. Our last excursion was to the Western Australian Art Gallery where students got their imagination going and worked together in the 'Exquisite Bodies' activity done as a warm-up by artists. In this activity students and staff took turns to make an artwork where one person drew the head, the next person drew the body, and the last person drew the legs without seeing what the other person drew before. At the end the artwork was very creative and funny.

In class we have continued our focus on life skills. In sewing, we view teaching our students to sew as a valuable skill that can foster creativity, confidence, and self-reliance. Students have been learning the basics of sewing, such as how to use a sewing machine, how to cut and pin fabric, and how to sew different types of stitches and seams. An example of students fantastic sewing are their awesome heat bags.

Also, cooking classes offer so many life benefits to our students. In class the focus has been on hygiene, healthy eating habits, safety, and teamwork in the kitchen. Students have faced some challenges, such as handling sharp knives, working with hot stoves and appliances, and correctly handling raw ingredients. Some delicious dishes have been created. It has been great to see students try new foods and some have been surprised as to how tasty their new meals have been.

LAKE RICHMOND MACROINVERTEBRATE SAMPLING

Our local patch, Lake Richmond is truly a haven for wildlife! The Year 9 Bush Rangers recently embarked on a series of exciting excursions to sample the lake's waters using dip nets. Through careful classification, they were able to identify a wide variety of macroinvertebrates - or, as they are more commonly known, water bugs! From water mites and diving beetles to soldier fly larvae and damsel fly larvae, these intrepid explorers found them all. What's more, they learned that these water bugs are incredibly sensitive to pollution - making them perfect indicators of Lake Richmond's water quality. And as if that were not enough, they even spotted a majestic black swan nesting near the boardwalk - a stunning up-close encounter with Western Australia's emblematic bird!



AUSTRALIA SEA LION INCURSION SERIES

Our conservation project for the Australian Sea Lion is underway in 2023. The Year 10 students had the opportunity to meet with Marine Scientist, Chandra Salgado Kent, to learn about the endangered species. They then participated in a masterclass with Steve Panozzo, The Cartoon Factory via Webex, where they honed their drawing skills and created beautiful drawings of the Australian Sea Lion. To finish off the term, the students met with DBCA Marine Ranger, Matt Lenane, who explained the role of a Marine Ranger and their contribution to protecting Western Australian marine life. Thank you to our wonderful local businesses who have been supporting our students this year.









Bushfire Plan 2023/2024

Bushfire Zone Register

The Department of Education (the Department) is committed to maximising the safety of its students and staff. Rockingham SHS Education Support Centre has been added to the Bushfire Zone Register. Inclusion on this register means that the school may be required to close the school on a day for which a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating (FDR) has been declared for the City of Rockingham. A Catastrophic FDR means that if a fire starts, it is likely to be uncontrollable, unpredictable and fast moving.

What does this mean for our school?

When given advance warning by the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) that a Catastrophic FDR has been forecast for a given day, the Deputy Director General, Schools may direct the closure of Rockingham SHS Education Support Centre. If the school receives such a directive, you will be informed of the possible planned closure by a letter sent home with your child. Parents of students absent on the day this letter is sent home will be contacted by telephone, so please ensure the school has up to date contact details for you.

In the period between the announcement of the closure and the day of planned closure, DFES will keep the Department informed of any change to the FDR forecast for the declared day. The final decision to close the school will be confirmed with the principal no later than 4.30pm on the day before the planned closure. If the forecast changes after that deadline, the closure will stand, regardless of improvements to the weather conditions later in the afternoon of the day before the planned closure or overnight. The intention is to limit confusion for parents and to allow you ample time to make alternative child care arrangements.

Parents will be advised of the confirmation of closure, or its reversal, by a note sent home with your child on the day before the planned closure. Again, parents of students absent on this day will be contacted by telephone.

How will I know when the school is reopening?

It is anticipated that the school will typically only be required to close for a single day at a time, however this will depend on the weather. You will receive an SMS to advise you whether the school will reopen the day after the planned closure, or whether it will remain closed. The school website will contain a notice to advise you of the current status of the school closure and when it is expected to reopen.

I ask that you monitor local media for current information about fire danger ratings and notification of schools reopening. Staying tuned to ABC Local Radio in your locality is advisable. You can also check with DFES on 13 DFES (13 33 37) or www.dfes.wa.gov.au and Emergency WA. Alternatively, you can call the school on 9523 7600 or the South Metro Regional Education Office on 9336 9563.
